



OHIO811's Role in Underground Damage Prevention Through Safe Excavation

OHIO811 serves as the “Call Before You Dig” protection service in Ohio, connecting those with a need to excavate with those who own, operate, or maintain underground utilities.

Notifying OHIO811 is a free public safety service available to all Ohioans. OHIO811 is a 501(c)(6), not-for-profit organization who is funded through member participation and not through tax-payer dollars.

How Does This Work?

When planning to excavate, the person responsible for digging provides a notice to OHIO811. The information regarding planned excavations received by OHIO811 is then transmitted to registered utilities in the excavation area, so these utilities can identify and mark their buried lines with flags, paint, or stakes.

Ohio law requires any person digging to notify OHIO811 prior to beginning their work, this includes homeowners, professional excavators, utilities, municipalities, and any individual or entity disturbing the surface of the earth.

Key Details:

Notifying OHIO811 is simple by dialing **8-1-1**, or using remote tools on the **OHIO811 mobile app** or **OHIO811.org**. Notify at least 2 working days, not including the day of the notification, before beginning any excavation.

- ‘Working Days’ do not include weekends or legal holidays.
- Excavation must begin within 16 calendar days of the notification being placed.
- When hiring a contractor to excavate on your property, they are required to notify OHIO811 of their work. Please confirm with all contractors if they have made their 8-1-1 notice prior to beginning work on your property.
- Utilities are responsible to identify and mark their buried lines.
 - The excavator will receive an email confirmation upon making their excavation notice *and* a status email (known as ‘Positive Response’) when the 2 working day notice has passed.

Are all Utilities Notified by Calling 8-1-1?

Ohio law requires utility owners with underground facilities to register with OHIO811; these **registered utilities are notified by contacting OHIO811**. However, be aware that not all utilities have registered with OHIO811.

When Excavation Damages a Utility

What Happens When a Utility is Damaged from Excavation?

When excavation damages a buried utility, the first action should always be the same: stop work, get everyone to safety, and secure the area until appropriate parties have been notified and mobilized.

Next, report the damage to the appropriate parties immediately. Quick, accurate reporting helps everyone work together to protect life, mitigate the hazard, safely restore services, and prevent similar incidents in the future.

Safety First

Ohio law requires all utility damages from excavation to be reported to:

- OHIO811
- The damaged utility*
- The appropriate emergency response agencies if the damage results in escaping flammable, corrosive, explosive, or toxic liquids or gas.

**If the owner of the damaged utility is unknown, reporting to OHIO811 satisfies this requirement*
